Today's Program: "My Art Journey" with our artists; Marti Fann, Julie Northcott, Judy Harris and Cindy Parris

Marti Fann: My journey started as a child and continued while raising two boys. Read art books and took class with Fay Henderson. Joined Bon Air and was President for (2) years. Took Carrie Burns Brown teaching techniques and taught Beginning Watercolor class for (24) students for (10) years and learned more from them. Today, just painting and I now do layers which may take weeks.

Julie Northcott: My journey started in 1st grade painting animals like a Purple Cow. Throughout school did scenery for plays and a 10-foot tall "Praying Hands" for backdrop. I learned to use oil paints and took all kinds of workshops to find my style. Have a BFA and master's in art education and taught at (3) colleges. My best commissions were from (3) dentists and (2) orthodontics. They wanted art for patients to see when in dental chair. Went from oil to watercolor. Then went to mixed media and collage. I like to experiment and not paint normal.

Judy Harris: I always knew I loved art. As a child had paper dolls and old magazines. I went to college for Art Education and was an art teacher at \$9,000 a year. Did illustrations for Fort Lee training manual cookbook, did cross stitch patterns for a company. Built up my portfolio while teaching. I illustrated for Phillip Morris for a couple years and did drawings for the Railroad Engineering Department. Began 3D drawings for railroad bearings to help test and fit. Took painting classes at night and with Faye Henderson. Like jewelry and painting.

Cindy Parris: Started as a kid and first commission was a soap box for a kid for \$5.00. With husband in military, we traveled the states and Germany. Started doing stain glass. Did (10) lamps for a restaurant in Fayetteville, NC. Did all the stained glass for the Cable Car Building in D.C. In California, did plein air using oils. At Crossroads, I do a lot of animals and abstract. Have used air dried clay relief and resin for years. Use gloves and a mask when sanding. Used a special respirator when working with resin.
